## places to study

Many students opt to study on campus. You can choose to work with your fellow students or housemates in a concentrated and motivated way or on your own without distraction. The TU Delft campus has many great rooms. Because of COVID-19, Pulse and the Library are either closed for self-study or offer only limited opening. Keep a close eye on social media and Brightspace for updates.



- 1 **Pulse:** An attractive, well-lit space with lecture rooms that also serve as places to study. A range of pop-up food outlets serve all kinds of dishes here all year long.
- 2 **Library:** At the University Library, there are lots of places to study and a computer room. It's also possible to book a place to study in advance. It's easy to arrange on the website using your campus card. You can also obtain food and drinks here.
- 4 **Fellowship:** Slightly more remote, but still worthwhile taking the effort to cycle there. Even during the busiest examination weeks, you have a good chance of securing a place to study in this building.
- 5 **Echo:** This beautiful building is being developed in order to accommodate the increasing need for places to study. It is expected to open in the academic year 2021-2022. So, you'll have to be patient!



## Mytudelft app mytimetable

For the publication of teaching and examination timetables, we use **mytimetable.tudelft.nl**. You can use it to compile your own timetable, link it to your calendar or just consult it. You need to log in with your NetID in order to save or personalise your timetable. The timetables are published every semester. Once you've saved it, your timetable will appear in the MyTUDelft app. In this app, you can also find more personal information about your degree programme.

## teaching rooms

When you have classes on campus, they may not necessarily be taught in your own faculty. Carefully check your timetable, because you may have a lecture in another faculty or even somewhere completely different in Delft. On [esviewer.tudelft.nl](https://esviewer.tudelft.nl), you can find an overview of all of the rooms.

## examination registrations

You can register for your examinations online via Osiris. You can find Osiris in the Brightspace menu and log in using your NetID. You need to have registered by two weeks before your examination at the latest. **Tip: set an alarm on your phone halfway through weeks 2 and 7 to remind you to register.**

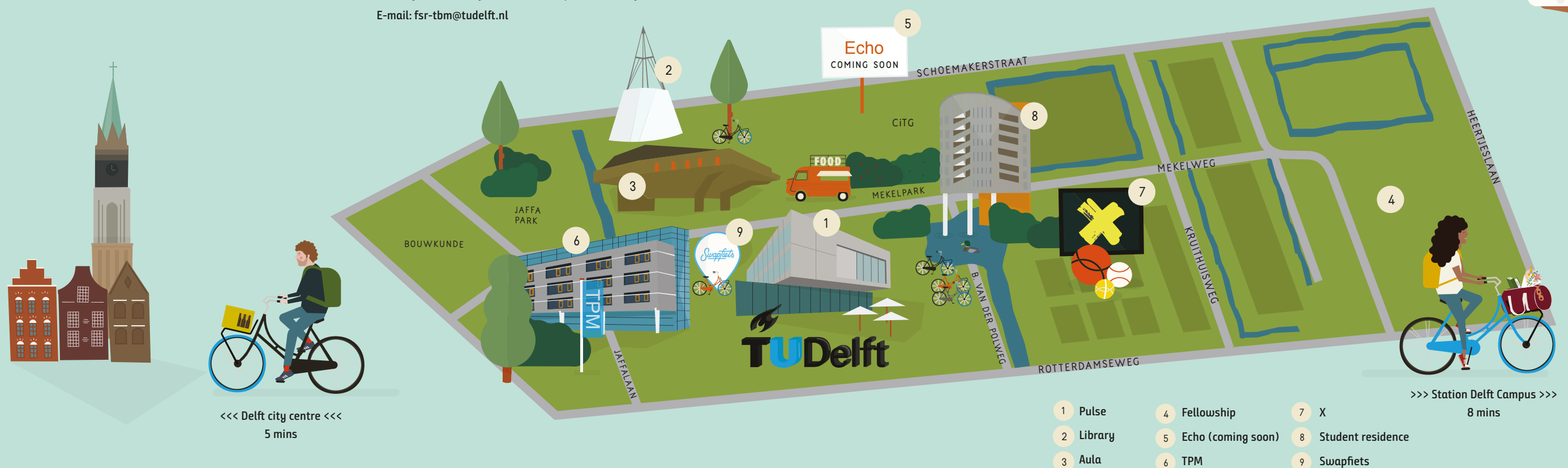

## brightspace

Brightspace is the digital collaboration and learning environment at TU Delft. You can find Brightspace via this link: [brightspace.tudelft.nl](https://brightspace.tudelft.nl). As with TU Delft mail, you log in using your TU Delft NetID. Once logged in, you can change your profile settings in Brightspace to suit your preferences. For example, you can choose which courses (listed in the course catalogue) you wish to see by pinning them and you can also select your own settings for accessibility and notifications. sv.t.b. curius

**S.V.T.B. Curius** is the study association for Technology, Policy & Management with a membership of around 1800 students. Almost all new students join Curius. The association focuses on three so-called pillars: social activities, education and careers. Social and career-related activities are organised throughout the year. Two board members of the association devote a year full-time to improving the faculty's education. The board is made up of six members working full-time for the association. In the upcoming year, the association will be celebrating its 28th anniversary.

HET HOK

From Monday to Friday, the Curius board can be found in their office, known as 'het hok'. It's located in wing A on the ground floor of TPM. You can always approach them if you have a question, a complaint about teaching or just want a chat. And don't forget: coffee and tea are available free at het hok. mentorship

During the first months of your degree programme, you will be guided by a mentor. A senior student will work with you to help get your degree programme off to as good a start as possible. You and nine other students will make up a mentor group and will have regular contact, especially in the first months. Your mentor will brief you on what you need to know and provide useful tips to help you progress in your studies. You can also turn to your mentor with all kinds of other questions. Can you provide summaries of that particularly tricky course? How do I find a room? What is student life like? So, feel free to fire away!

campus card

As soon as you start, you will be issued with your campus card. This serves as an ID card that you can use to access services, such as the Library and X. However, it is also used to control access to certain buildings and printing and locker facilities. When using teaching or examination facilities, you will also need to show the campus card. If you are unable to show your card, you may be barred from participating.

academic counsellors

lockers

Do you want to avoid having to lug your books around on your bike? Lockers can be found in various places on campus, including at **TPM, X** and **Pulse**. They really come in handy during examination week, for example. All you need to open and close the lockers is your campus card. In the faculty, you hire a locker for a week and it's emptied every Friday. Accidentally left your things in your locker? No worries, if you ask nicely at the Service Desk, you will always get them back.



DENTATUS

Dentatus is the study association for all students taking the Master's programme in Engineering and Policy Analysis (EPA). Although Dentatus forms part of Curius, they are unique as they are located in The Hague. Their goal is to create a supportive and enjoyable environment for EPA students by extending the activities of Curius to The Hague.

transport

The best way to get to TU Delft is by bike. It's easy to cycle to campus from Delft city centre or the surrounding neighbourhoods and towns. You can park your bike in the large bike rack at the back of TPM or next to one of the other buildings. If you don't yet have a bike, take a look at [swapfiets.nl](http://swapfiets.nl), where it's easy to hire a bike for a short or longer period. If it gets broken, it will be repaired or changed straight away.

Delft has two railway stations, **Delft** and **Delft Campus**. There are buses to campus from both stations. Various **bus services** run past or even on campus itself. If the plans go ahead, there will even be a **tram** running on campus from next academic year.



ONLINE EDUCATION

7 insider tips!

- 1. **Make sure you have a good workspace:** a good chair and a tidy desk are an excellent start.
- 2. **During the weekend, draw up a weekly schedule** for your lectures, the required reading and any compulsory classes. This ensures you know what to expect.
- 3. **Lecturers prefer to be able to see you:** a webcam and a microphone are essential.
- 4. **It's important to participate regularly in sports!** When working at home, you can quickly start exercising less, partly because you don't need to cycle to the university. Playing sports is essential for your concentration and health.
- 5. **Maintain contact with your fellow students.** Make clear agreements about when you will study together on a group assignment, for example. Coming up with ideas with other people is easier, more effective and more fun.
- 6. **Watch your lectures live as far as possible.** Staying in bed and 'catching up later', is often ineffective, however attractive staying in bed may sound.
- 7. **Finally, perhaps the most important tip: asking for help is not a weakness!** The academic counsellors, your fellow students and lecturers are ready and waiting to help. Offer support to each other and encourage each other! Often just listening can really make a difference.



housing

When looking for a room in Delft, there are various options.

FOR DUTCH STUDENTS:

**DUWO.** You can use the DUWO website, and specifically its feature called Room, to search for and respond to rooms in Delft.

**Roombase.** A free website with lots of rooms on offer.

**Kamernet.** A website with many rooms on offer that you need to join if you want to respond.

**Facebook page "Kamer in Delft".** Facebook page with an up-to-date listing of rooms in Delft.

**Friends and acquaintances** who already live in Delft. You may already know someone who can point you in the right direction towards a potentially suitable house. That can help you make progress in your search.

**Associations.** It may be possible to find a house through a student association. The large student associations, such as Virgiel or DSC, are probably the best to try. The instemming house interviews take place just after introduction week.

FOR FOREIGN STUDENTS:

Make sure to arrange your accommodation before arriving in the Netherlands, as you are officially required to register a valid Dutch address **within 5 days after arrival in the Netherlands**. Registering a valid Dutch address at the local municipality is a legal obligation for all who intend to stay in the Netherlands for 4 months or more, irrespective of nationality or purpose of stay. A valid and registered address allows you to obtain a BSN (Citizen Service Number), which is needed to interact with Dutch authorities.

Three ways to find housing:

- Through your educational institute (accommodating)
- ROOM: On the basis of your registration time
- Vote ins: be selected by your new roommates
