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

Water connects

August 2020, Delft


Dear partners,

The new normal

Dear partners,
The coronavirus (Covid-19) pandemic has shown little respect for maritime borders and it took just three months to bring the world to a standstill, proving how intricately connected we are. The new academic year in the Netherlands kicked off this month with more on-site educational activities taking place. This is only possible if the government institutions are followed closely. Furthermore, educational institutions have to stagger their teaching activities, so that students do not place a burden on public transport at peak hours. 
Dear partners,




Multi-disciplinary research in the Cai River Basin

Four TU Delft Master students following different tracks of Civil Engineering have spent the past weeks on a multi-disciplinary project in Vietnam at a distance. Their topic is: Assessment of the Current and Future Saltwater Intrusion into the Cai River in Nha Trang, Vietnam. Through remote sensing methods and modelling, they are trying to reach their research objectives. The group is supervised by our partners Dr. Astrid Blom, Dr. Thom Bogaard and Juliette Eulderink from TU Delft as well as Thuyloi staff members Dr. Mai Van Cong, Dr. Dinh Nhat Quang and Dr. Mai Cao Tri. Their final results will be presented to the public on Friday July 2nd.



Citizen Science on Water Resources Monitoring in the Nhue River, Vietnam

HUNRE lecturer Ngoc Huan Tran has published his research in *Water Security in Asia* (Springer Water). One of his co-authors is our partner and associate professor at TU Delft, Martine Rutten. The research is on Citizen Science on Water Resources Monitoring in the Nhue River, Vietnam. Huan created pilot citizen science projects at two sluices at Lien Mac, Noi Bridge, and one pumping station at Dong Bong on the Nhue River, Vietnam. You can find the full article [here](#).

Kick-off meeting for Nuffic-funded TMT+ on Google Earth Engine (HKV and TU Delft)

At the beginning of June, HKV and TU Delft had the kick-off meeting with HUNRE representatives for the Nuffic-funded TMT+ on Google Earth Engine. The name of the project is: *Tailor-made capacity building on river morphology and flood risk using state-of-the-art open satellite data and processing tools*. In the coming months, HKV and TU Delft will prepare the training, which will run from October 2021 - March 2022.

More courses will follow starting next academic year, including a second run of the Research Set-Up and Literature Review (due to the large interest in this course from our Vietnamese partners).






HUNRE graduate Dung obtains OKP Master Programme Scholarship

On June 3rd, we kicked off the online course on Multi-Hazard Risk Assessment for our partners from HUNRE and Thuyloi University. They will do so with the aid of GIS and remote sensing. They will also learn how this information can be used in risk management, with a focus on urban areas and delta regions.
